The Readings

The First Reading: Ephesians 1:11-end

In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit^[f] of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in

order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

The Gospel Reading: Luke 6:20-31 Looking at his disciples, Jesus said:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be satisfied.

Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

Blessed are you when people hate you, when they exclude you and insult you and reject your name as evil, because of the Son of Man.

"Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, because great is your reward in heaven. For that is how their ancestors treated the prophets.

"But woe to you who are rich,
for you have already received your comfort.

Woe to you who are well fed now,
for you will go hungry.

Woe to you who laugh now,
for you will mourn and weep.

Woe to you when everyone speaks well of you,
for that is how their ancestors treated the false prophets.

"But to you who are listening I say: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. If someone slaps you on one cheek, turn to them the other also. If someone takes your coat, do not withhold your shirt from them. Give to everyone who asks you, and if anyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you."

Reflection by Liz

In the past few weeks, we have had some beautiful sunny days when the sunlight has been quite dazzling. It gives a whole new view of the world around us in this autumn season. One of the things that I particularly like to see on such days is the way that the sun accentuates the colours on the stained glass in churches. The colours become so vibrant that the pictures stand out more vividly than ever and as the light streams through, the colours are reflected onto the walls and surfaces around them. As well as admiring the workmanship in the stained glass, it is also fascinating to identify the Bible stories they represent or, in some cases, the saints who have a special connection with the church.

Each year when it comes around to celebrating All Saints, I resort to looking on the internet for information about saints and become enthralled as I discover the stories of different saints and the groups they represent. This year, I was especially pleased to discover St Philip Neri, an Italian priest from the sixteenth century who is the patron saint of joy and laughter. (though the pictures that were used with his description hardly reflected that — maybe it was a deep inner joy!) A timely reminder that saints can be like ordinary people and may not always like to be captured in pictures! Whether it's being patron saints of countries or more specific things like cobblers, glovemakers or gout sufferers, there are numerous saints who are widely recognised or at least, named in lists of saints. But on All Saints, we celebrate the lives of all the Saints, known and unknown.

It feels strange to say they are unknown as obviously they must have been known to some people around them and definitely, they would be known to God. But there are many people who would not be widely known and yet, would be considered saints. Simply, they are people who are loved by God and who let that love work in their lives and shape the people that they become.

Sometimes, as in the case of some of the more famous saints that may lead to some amazing acts or miracles, but that is not always the case. What matters is God's love and the effect it has on individuals.

I'm reminded of a **pumpkin story:** "What is it like to be a Christian saint?" "It is like being a Halloween pumpkin. God picks you from the field, brings you in, and washes all the dirt off you. Then he cuts off the top and scoops out the yucky stuff. He removes the pulp of impurity and injustice and seeds of doubt, hate, and greed. Then He carves you a new smiling face and puts His light of love inside you to shine for the entire world to see." This is the Christian idea behind the carved pumpkins during the Halloween season. It seems quite dramatic, but certainly gives an idea of how God's love can change people's lives.

Whether it is by a dramatic revelation of God's love or a gradual realisation of the power of such love, the common factor is undoubtedly God's love. For all the saints, both known and unknown, that is the key factor. Their lives are lived in the certainty of that love. They know that God's love surrounds and upholds them through anything that life may thrust upon them. No doubt, there will have been people that you have known who have been secure and grounded in God's love, who have known the reassurance of his constant presence in their lives in both joyful and difficult times. They may not have been depicted in stained glass windows, but their lives will have brought the light of love into the lives of those they mixed with.

Wonderfully, God's love is there for all people. We, like those saints we remember, need to trust in the One who gives it so generously and to live in God's love. Quite often, the Bible uses the word "abide" – to abide in God's love with its image of being at home in God's love, truly settled in his love. What an amazing picture – and how reassuring for all parts of our lives. As we live in such generous love, we pray that our lives will begin to reflect that love and light to those around us.

So, as we remember All Saints, may we be inspired by the lives of the Saints, give thanks for those special people we have known who have been channels of God's love in our lives and may we commit ourselves to abiding in God's love so that our lives may reflect God's love for those we meet.
